As I sit down to write this message, it is a beautiful late May day. The summer projects are already underway. As always they fall into two categories, the planned and the surprises. Isn't that life?! Once again let me be sure to invite all of you to set aside September 26, 2010 to come to the Village Park for the celebration of our 100th birthday. Also, I want to thank most sincerely the members of the planning committee for this special day and those who have worked so hard to update the history of the village. The history book should be available on the day of the festivities; attend and pick up your copy.

We all know that these are difficult economic times. It is very important that all of you know that the village employees and the Ozaukee County employees in recognition of what is happening in the economy took 0% INCREASE IN SALARY. This is indeed an exceptional commitment as we try our best to hold the line on our costs, keep services in place, and with an eye on being just to our employees. We thank them most sincerely! If you are so inclined, you too might thank them.

Just a reminder, the village has a cable television channel; it is Channel 25, and it lists meetings and events. We do our best to keep it up to date. There is other pertinent information which may be helpful to you. I suspect it will not be as much fun as Jay Leno.

There are 160 businesses in Thiensville. Please do all you can to support them. It is so important that we realize that special people have faith that doing business in our community makes sense. If you need something, do check to see if someone is offering the service right here in the village. Whether it is stepping up to contribute to the 100<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration or fixing up their property, these are Thiensville's business people.

Over the last ten years, the village has done many capital improvements. We certainly are proud of them; in some cases such as Pigeon Creek, they are easy to see. In other instances, such as manhole and sewer rehabilitation, sanitary sewer relays, or storm water management they are fairly invisible. Seven million dollars has been spent on these projects; a considerable portion of the dollars have come from grant money which has been obtained through the good work of our administrator and engineers. Recently we received a new \$679,000 grant to control water. Good job Dianne Robertson and Ruekert and Mielke!

One of our citizens asked that I include in the newsletter my brief words at the Memorial Day gathering after the parade. The following is the heart of that little talk:

It is very important that we come together here each year to remember the men and women who have served and continue to serve in the defense of our country. The prospect of that service being the ultimate sacrifice of their lives makes it incredibly significant and worthy of praise.

As we pause here today, we remember that these women and men were of all nationalities; they were brown, black, and white; they were Jews, Muslims, Protestants, Catholics, in fact all faiths, and people who brought no faith tradition with them; in some cases they were not even citizens, and in other instances, they were attempting to demonstrate that they were worthy of full citizenship. Some were people who left the fighting of their native lands because it didn't make sense to them, but when they came here, they related to the nobility of the cause before them and willingly joined in it.

So today we remember them with all of their differences, all their strength, all their optimism, all their courage, and all their sacrifice. For those who made it home safely, we are most grateful. For those who did not we say thank you, God speed, rest in peace forever.

In conclusion, I'd like to mention that we plan to finish the dam stabilization and fish ladder between the Fourth of July celebration and September 26<sup>th</sup> so that the project can be dedicated on that special occasion. Special thanks to any citizens who have been inconvenienced by our projects. I sincerely believe we will view them as great steps forward as we go into the future. Blessings to all!

## **POLICE DEPARTMENT**

I am happy to report that there are no major road construction projects scheduled in the village this summer.

With summer approaching it is the beginning of the festival and events season in the village. Family Fun Before the Fourth events will be held on Saturday, June 26th. We again ask your patience and understanding during events which will create the need to impose special parking restrictions and reroute traffic. As always, we will do our best to minimize the disruptions.

On Friday, June 18th, 2010 the Fiddleheads Thiensville Criterion Bike Race will be held in Thiensville. This is the first time for the event and plans are underway to set-up the race schedule and course. We do know the race course will operate near Main Street and Freistadt Road and extend east into the subdivisions. Our officers will work with the race sponsors to insure safety for the riders and our residents once final details are worked out with the organizers.

The department would like to ask for everyone's help to avoid a repeat of a problem which occurred in our residential areas late last year. In December we had thirteen vehicles entered in an area at the north end of the village. All of the vehicles entered were vehicles parked on the driveways of homes and were unlocked. Our belief is that these incidents were crimes of opportunity for the actors and that locked vehicles would have been a very effective deterrent in most of the cases.

If you are going to be away from home please make sure you lock the house and shut the garage door. Preventative measures like this have been shown to reduce the potential for criminal conduct by as much as 50%. If you are going to be away for an extended period of time, call our department, and we will keep an eye on the house while you are gone. You might also want to alert a trusted neighbor or friend to keep an eye on the home as well.

Park activities abound during the summer. Thiensville Village Park is available to everyone daily from sunrise to sunset. One major change has been made in the park area this year. Skateboarding is not permitted under the park pavilion or on any bench or table in the park.

Curfew and night parking restrictions are in effect all year in the village. When school is not in session curfew is 12:00 AM for children under the age of 18. Night parking is prohibited for more than 30 minutes on village streets between 2:00-6:00 AM. If you need to park a vehicle on the street overnight, call our department to secure permission.

The department has entered into a new program in cooperation with the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewage District and Veolia Recycling.

We now accept unused or unwanted medications from residents for disposal at a special facility. Prescription and non-prescription medications along with a number of other over the counter products are accepted. An information sheet on this program is available at the municipal center or you can call our department for information. Disposing of drugs through this program keeps them out of our drinking water and landfills.

The Thiensville Police Department is here to serve the community. Officers conduct their patrols based not only on detection and apprehension but to insure quality of life in the village. Our goal is to provide the level of service the community expects of us in an efficient manner. Comments or suggestions on how to address issues which improves the overall environment are always welcome.

Call us with your concerns. We work for you and want to do the best job we can. Thanks for all of your support and have a great summer.

### **In the future**

There is very early discussion of the possibility of a storm water utility to be developed for Thiensville. We have had a wonderful history of trying to set aside money for future needs; it is in this spirit that the thought has been introduced. It is not something which is going forward now, but the idea has been brought forward.

### **Schools take a hit & so do property taxes**

Facing mounting deficits, the 2009-11 state budget cut state aid to schools for the first time in modern memory. It also tightened the state's revenue limits on local school districts. The result for taxpayers will be an average potential school tax hike that could reach 7.8%.

## State Output Grows Slowly

Wisconsin's gross domestic product (GDP), a measure of goods and services produced by the state, increased 3.0% in 2008, to \$240.4 billion. From 1998 to 2008, GDP rose 49.6%, or an average of 4.1% annually. At 3.0%, growth in 2008 was slower than in any of the past 10 years.

Of the major geographic regions of the country, the Great Lakes grew the least during the 10 years ending in 2008 (39.5%). GDP increased the most in the Southwest (90.4%), followed by the Rocky Mountains (80.1%), and Far West (70.8%).

## **FIRE DEPARTMENT**

The men and women of the Thiensville Fire Department want you to start your grilling season off safely. Follow these facts and tips from the National Fire Protection Association. We wish you a happy summer and are always here when you need us for emergency and non-emergency help.

### **Facts:**

- Damage from grill fires caused \$30 million dollars in damage in 2002.
- Gas grills have a higher fire risk than charcoal grill (leaks and breaks in gas lines are the leading cause).
- Placing combustibles too close to heat, and leaving the cooking unattended are the two leading causes of charcoal grill home fires.
- Half of all gas and charcoal grill home fires begin on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch.
- Structural member or framing, wall coverings, exterior trim and plants are the leading items first ignited in outdoor charcoal grill fires.

### **Safety Tips:**

- Grills must not be used on or under balconies.
- Position grills well away from siding, deck railing, eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place grills a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from grill area; declare a three foot safe zone around the grill.
- Put out several long handled tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when flipping food.
- Periodically remove grease and fat buildup in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

## **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS**

### **Garbage Collection**

Containers cannot exceed 32 gallons with a maximum of 60 pounds and shall be at the roadside prior to 7AM on the day of pickup. Materials shall not be placed at the roadside more than 24 hours prior to pickup.

Trees, branches or shrubs with a diameter over three inches should be cut in lengths of two feet and stacked and tied at the roadside on the day of your garbage collection.

Grass clippings and leaves may be disposed of at the public works yard on W. Freistadt Road. You need to purchase a recycling gate card at the Village Hall, and the cost is \$10.00.

### **Does Your Home Have FOG?**

Fats, oil and grease (FOG) can be a main cause of sanitary sewer backups. FOG comes from meat scraps, cooking oil, lard, butter, gravy, mayonnaise, salad dressings, sour cream and other fatty items. They accumulate in sewer pipes and may lead to basement backups.

Do not pour FOG down the drain. You can prevent FOG from causing a sewer backup by following these simple disposal methods. Wipe grease from pots and pans before washing them or put the grease in a tightly sealed container and dispose of in the garbage. Large amounts of oil can be mixed with cat litter, sealed in a plastic bag and put in the garbage.

Running hot water after pouring FOG down the drain will only work for a short time. FOG cools rapidly and hardens either in your sanitary lateral or the Village's main line where it could cause a sewer backup for you or your neighbors.

### **RETURN THE STURGEON**

Over the last three years, Riveredge Nature Center has worked with the Wisconsin DNR, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and other partners to pilot a long-term project to restore a breeding population of lake sturgeon to the Milwaukee River. Being the largest native fish in the great lakes, the lake sturgeon is a powerful symbol of the environment and culture in our region. The Potawatomi, Menominee, Winnebago, Ojibwa, Oneida and Sauk tribes all revered this giantfish.

The eggs are harvested from sturgeon spawning in the Wolf river and raised in the Streamside Rearing Facility (SRF) at Riveredge where they imprint on Milwaukee River water. The SRF is the only one operating in Wisconsin, with day-to-day operations carried out by volunteers. The 6-8" fingerlings will be released during the Return the Sturgeon Celebration, Saturday, October 2, at Thiensville Village Park. Individuals and families will have an opportunity to sponsor and release their own fish.

### REGISTER TO VOTE

To avoid long lines on any Election Day, register early at the Village Hall between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Identification is needed with your current address. Examples include a driver's license, utility bill, property tax bill, or deed to your property or rental agreement. If you have moved or had a name change, you may change your voter registration information at the Village Hall or at the polls on Election Day.

Electors must provide their driver's license number. If the elector does not have a driver's license, he/she must provide the last four digits of their social security number. All Thiensville voters vote at the Thiensville Municipal Building, 250 Elm Street.

### REAL ESTATE TAXES ARE DUE

The second real estate tax installment is due to the Ozaukee County Treasurer by July 31. Please contact the County Treasurer's office at 238-8280 with any questions.

The Homestead High School homecoming parade will be held Friday, October 1 at 5:00 PM. Football game follows at 7:00 PM. The parade starts at Walgreen's on Main Street.

### CLEAR WATER CODE COMPLIANCE

A Clear Water Code Compliance is necessary anytime you sell your home. The forms are available at the Village Hall, and the cost is \$40.00. This inspection protects the Village sanitary sewers from additional clear water making its way into the system.

### RECYCLING

Newspapers, cans, glass bottles and jars, various plastics, and empty aerosol cans will **NOT** be collected with the regular garbage pickup. These items must be recycled. **ONLY** grass clippings, leaves and garden refuse may be disposed of at the Department of Public Works yard behind the Post Office. A gate card may be purchased at the Village Hall for residents for only \$10.00. Waste oil may be deposited at the tank located at the DPW yard.

### HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Residents can take their household hazardous waste and old computers, monitors and keyboards to Onyx Environmental Services in Port Washington, 1275 Mineral Springs Drive. The fees are based on the item and quantity. Please call Hazardous Waste Hotline at (262) 243-8998 for further information.

### VILLAGE PERMITS & DUMPSTERS

Please remember that for any building, remodeling, fences, signs, electrical, heating/ventilation, and plumbing work done in your home or business a permit must be pulled, and they are available at the Village Hall. Avoid double fees by paying in advance.

If you are remodeling, you are responsible for disposing of all previous old material from your home. Dumpsters are available at the Village Hall for \$95.00 or for remodeling projects and construction debris they are \$200.00
